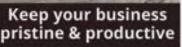

One of Margaret Dimond's proudest accomplishments – and there have been many during a long career in healthcare – was helping to spearhead Henry Ford Health System's involvement in opening a health center in Southwest Detroit to provide care to a largely Latino population.

Dimond is putting the same emphasis on serving the community now as regional system president of University of Michigan Health, overseeing all operations at Sparrow Health System and University of Michigan Health-West in Grand Rapids.

When she was vice president of ambulatory services for Henry Ford, she oversaw regional medical centers similar to the 48,000-square-foot clinic on Fort Street in Detroit in 2012. Henry Ford Health System partnered with the Community Health and Social Services Center (CHASS), which serves close to 11,000 patients a year, 70 percent of whom are Spanish speaking. Henry Ford Health System physicians were the center's healthcare providers.

Dimond said Michigan Medicine's emphasis on diversity and inclusion is one of the things that excites her most about Sparrow's new partnership with University of Michigan Health.

"Michigan Medicine has one of the most ambitious and

forward-thinking diversity programs in the country, and Sparrow and our community can only benefit from our partnership with them," she said.

University of Michigan Health is part of Michigan Medicine, whose diversity mission includes honoring the "well-

being, individuality and dignity of all who work, learn and heal" there and diversifying the next generation of physicians, nurses, health professionals and scientists.



"One of the many opportunities of our relationship with University of Michigan Health is to tap into their knowledge on diversity, equity and inclusion," Dimond said. "They just have a wealth of resources around DEI from an organizational standpoint and from their community equity work."

She also noted University of Michigan-West has been on a similar journey as Sparrow and now has a nationally recognized DEI program.

Dimond became regional president of University of Michigan Health on Sept. 1, just four months after being named president of E.W. Sparrow Hospital. In her short time at Sparrow and UM-Health she has made diversity a priority. She views diversity and inclusion as a central part of the organization's leadership responsibility to the community.

"We're here as a community health care provider and the Latino community is an essential cultural segment of our population," Dimond said.

She said she's humbled that Sparrow is among the few local employers represented on the board of the Lansing Latino Health Alliance. Sparrow's Debbie Lopez was recently named to the board.

Sparrow has worked closely with the Alliance for years and has co-sponsored the organization's annual Outstanding Latino Caregiver Award, which seeks to encourage Latinos to consider careers in healthcare. Sparrow is now seeking nominations of Sparrow caregivers for the 2023 award. You can find more information at Sparrow.org.

The Alliance is among many prominent partners Sparrow works with to promote diversity and inclusion, including Cristo Rey Community Center, NAACP, and the Michigan Diversity Education Center.

Sparrow truly believes that the health system is better positioned to succeed when its leaders and caregivers reflect the communities it serves.

That's why it views it as an imperative to hire people from diverse backgrounds who will add different perspectives, new information and world views that will make Sparrow stronger in delivering the best patient care.

Dimond has distinguished herself as an advocate and mentor for female leaders. She was part of the founding team of the Michigan State University Women's Leadership Institute.

She became president of E.W. Sparrow Hospital on May 2, 2023, and was the first woman to hold that position in the hospital's 127-year history.

Dimond has deep roots in Michigan, having begun as a pre-teen helping in her father's medical office in Dearborn. She has held numerous executive healthcare positions in Michigan, including serving as President and CEO of McLaren Oakland Hospital in Pontiac; President and CEO of Ascension Crittenton Hospital in Rochester; President and CEO of Karmanos Cancer Hospital; President and CEO of McLaren Medical Group; Vice President and COO of Henry Ford Hospital Warren campus; and Vice President of Ambulatory Services for Henry Ford Hospital in Detroit. She most recently served as Chief Administrative Officer of Naples Community Health Physician Group in Naples, Fla.

She also has strong roots with MSU, having served as Assistant Dean of the MSU College of Human Medicine. She received her doctorate in Philosophy from MSU, while earning a master's degree in Public Administration from the University of Michigan, a master's in Social Work from Boston College, and a bachelor's degree from St. Mary's College, Notre Dame, Ind.

Dimond recently received the Distinguished Alumni Award from MSU's College of Social Science.

"I am incredibly pleased to be back in the Lansing area and to work with our community to provide world-class patient care to Lansing and all of Mid-Michigan," she said.

Eat Healthy/Be Active!

Find fun ways to stay active during the winter months by trying something new like ice skating or sledding with your kids, or take a quick walk outside most days of the week. Also, make the choice to try some new varieties of fruits and vegetables to keep mealtimes interesting and to keep you from eating unhealthy junk food when you snack.

MARCH

Wash Hands Often!

The harsh winter weather may be ending and the temperatures rising, but keeping your hands clean all year will help you to avoid getting sick and spreading germs to others. Wash your hands frequently with soap and clean running water for at least 20 seconds. If soap and water are not available, use a hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol.

Get Check-ups & Vaccines!

Health exams and screenings can help find health problems early or before they start. In addition, vaccinations are safe and effective, and help to protect you, your loved ones and your community against vaccine preventable diseases. Schedule a visit with your health care provider today to make sure you are up-to-date on your vaccines.

MAY

Make Time to Sleep Well!

Make sure you get enough sleep - 10 to 12 hours of sleep each night for children, and adults need 7 to 8 hours of sleep. When adults and children are well rested, they are more alert and ready for a more productive day to work and learn.

JUNE

Be Smoke Free!

Avoid smoking and breathing other people's smoke. If you smoke, quit today. If you need help quitting smoking, call **1-800-QUIT-NOW** or talk to you healthcare provider for more tips and resources.

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WTC is preparing students for their life beyond high school. Nearly 80% of our students continue their education after leaving high school either though apprenticeships, advanced training or two or four-year college degrees.

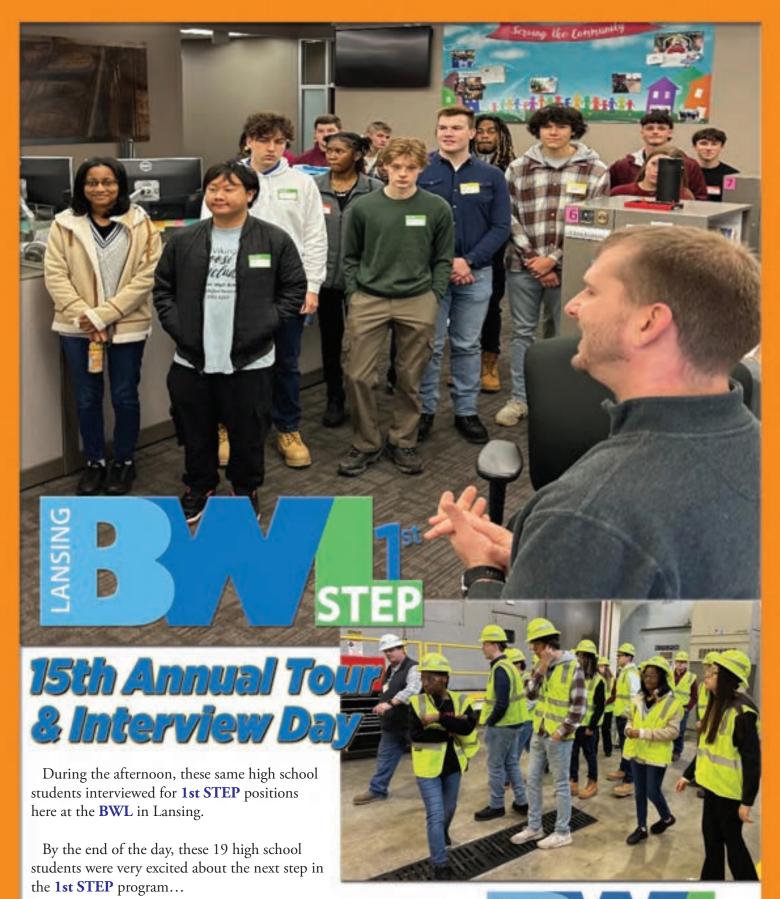
WTC está preparando a estudiantes para su vida más allá de la escuela superior. Casi 80% de nuestros estudiantes continúan su educación después de dejar la escuela superior, ya sea mediante aprendizaje de oficio, capacitación avanzada o títulos universitarios de dos o cuatro años.

However, the student's day was not finished when we returned from the tours.



Through 1st STEP, the BWL partners with local high schools to offer seniors a "paid work-based learning experience" where they learn about skilled trades and the utility industry.

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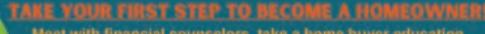

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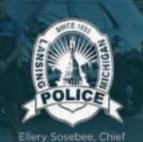

Increasing our Understanding of the Impacts of COVID-19

UPCOMING LOCAL EVENTS FOR THE LATING COMMUNITY

The COVID-19 pandemic clearly has made its devastating mark far and wide. The data published during the two initial years of the pandemic focused principally on its effects on physical health, hospitalizations and deaths. One serious effect noted during those years, but not broadly developed, was the barriers created by adverse effects of COVID-19, specifically the psychological impact on individuals and their mental health.

Researchers have reported recently that "many challenges contribute to disparities in mental health outcomes for Latinos, including cultural and language barriers, acculturation stress, discrimination, stigma, immigration status, socioeconomic status, and lack of access to mental health services."

Some of these points were also volunteered by Latino participants in focus groups and Town Halls held in the Greater Lansing Area in 2022-23. Misconceptions and myths surrounding mental health and mental health care are yet another "challenge" or "barrier" exacerbated by COVID-19.. According to a national survey, Latinos were more likely to report an increase in psychological distress than whites or Blacks during the pandemic.

In view of multiple effects of the pandemic on mental health, the Lansing Latino Health Alliance (LLHA) was awarded a grant through the Ingham County Health Department and the regional Health Equity Council to help the community understand further some of these challenges.

Specifically and at no charge to participants, the LLHA will:

- Hold focus groups for the Latino community to better understand barriers to optimal mental health;
- Develop materials on mental health and mental health services for Latino teens and adults;
- Engage the Latino community in two Town Hall discussions, led by mental health professionals, to combat myths and misconceptions about mental health and to decrease barriers to access mental health services.

Aumentando nuestra comprensión de los efectos de COVID-19

PRÓXIMOS EVENTOS LOCALES PARA LA COMUNIDAD LATINA

La pandemia de COVID-19 ha dejado claramente su destructora huella en todas partes. Los datos publicados durante los dos años iniciales de la pandemia se centraron principalmente en sus efectos sobre la salud física, las hospitalizaciones y las muertes. Un efecto grave observado durante esos años, pero sin amplio desarrollo, fueron las barreras creadas por las consecuencias adversas de la COVID-19, específicamente el impacto psicológico en la salud mental de las personas.

Algunos investigadores han informado que "muchos desafíos contribuyen a las disparidades en los resultados de salud mental de los latinos, incluidas las barreras culturales y lingüísticas, el estigma, el estatus migratorio, la discriminación, la situación socio-económica y la falta de acceso a servicios de salud mental."



Varios participantes latinos en grupos focales celebrados en el área metropolitana de Lansing en 2022 y 2023 voluntariamente mencionaron estos mismos puntos. Los conceptos erróneos y mitos que rodean la salud mental y la atención de la salud mental son otro "desafío" o "barrera" más de la COVID-19. Según una encuesta nacional, los latinos tenían más probabilidades de informar un aumento de la angustia psicológica que los blancos o los negros durante la pandemia.

En vista de los múltiples efectos de la pandemia en la salud mental, la Lansing Latino Health Alliance (LLHA) ha conseguido una subvención a través del Departamento de Salud del Condado de Ingham y el Consejo de Equidad en Salud para ayudar a la comunidad a comprender mejor estos desafíos.

Con ese fin, especificamente sin costo alguno para los partcipantes, la LLHA hará:

- Realizar grupos focales para que la comunidad latina comprenda mejor las barreras para tener salud mental óptima:
- Desarrollar materiales educativos sobre salud mental y servicios de salud mental para adolescentes y adultos latinos;
- Involucrar a la comunidad latina en dos reuniones comunitarias dirigidas por prefesionales de la salud mental, para destuir mitos y conceptos erróneos sobre la salud mental y disminuir las barreras de acceso los servicios mentales.

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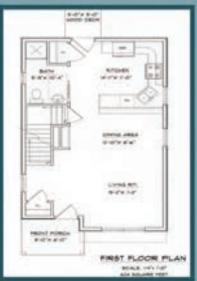

I grew up on the Westside of Lansing and graduated from J.W. Sexton High School in 2023. I am the grandson of Juan Jose Quesada, Sr., a man who gave so much to the Hispanic community here in Lansing. I'm trying to continue his legacy as I start this new chapter of my life.

As a Promise scholar, I am doing my schooling at LCC. When all is said and done, I hope to get my Master's in Social Work from Michigan State University. I also currently work for the Lansing Promise as a scholar advocate, helping the Promise try to figure out what students are thinking and experiencing and what we can do to earn their trust in order to really help them find success.

My own high school experience was interesting. I thought I was going to go into high school and get straight A's. However, I did not. I struggled, but I didn't give up. I graduated from high school after four strenuous years.

When I went into 9th grade, I did not know what I wanted to go into after graduation. It wasn't until my senior year that I knew what I wanted to do — and that's okay. Many students like me don't decide until our senior year. However, I wouldn't trade it for the world! The experiences I've had, the friends I've made, the people I've gotten to love and lose: those are what define my future and I've gained so many of those people who helped make high school amazing.

What I've learned from choosing my college path is that it's okay to change your mind and your major—and that students like me need support around those kinds of decisions. We need adults who would do anything for us and that means giving us space and wisdom.

I learned this because I was told that social work was not a good career. I was told that I wouldn't make any money or I would eventually wish I wouldn't have done it. That was not a good feeling and I wish my elder family members would have respected my choice.

We need family members that can tell us it's okay to go into trade school, especially family members we respect. When we have people who belittle our choices, it does nothing to help us. What we need to thrive is love and respect from our family members about our education and career choices.

In early 2023, I got the chance of a lifetime. A man named Justin Sheehan offered me an internship at the Lansing Promise. I had asked and asked until he had no choice but to give me a job! Now he's giving me the opportunity to help students exactly how he helped me. I want to help kids who may have never had a father figure realize that they can still make it, they don't have to give up, they can continue and that they can make something with their life.

The Promise is helping our community and world by giving students all kinds of opportunities. Opportunities like internships at different companies or scholarships to college or connecting with trade schools, all helping students give our future a chance. Promise is helping families by giving them resources to expand their minds and opportunities, and to change the way they think about and do school.

The Promise has helped me understand that I got to where I am by being persistent and not taking no for an answer. If I get an inch of opportunity, I always take a mile. I never stop asking questions—all it takes is for someone to offer an answer. And from what I've seen with my classmates, I'm not alone.

I believe that this generation is like no other. We all have amazing dreams. There is no reason to think differently. My generation is ready to change the world. But we need your love and respect. We need you to believe in us. We need you to offer opportunities we might not get anywhere else. We need our families and

communities to see us for who we are and who we want to be.

My generation is the future.

Me llamo Niko José Quesada y estoy orgulloso de ser un becario de la Promesa de Lansing. Crecí en el lado oeste de Lansing y me gradué de la escuela superior J.W. Sexton en 2023. Soy nieto de Juan José Quesada, Sr., un hombre que dio tanto a la comunidad hispana aquí en Lansing. Estoy tratando de continuar su legado al comenzar este nuevo capítulo de mi vida.

Como becario "Promise", estoy cursando mis estudios en LCC. Cuando todo esté dicho y hecho, espero obtener mi maestría en Trabajo Social de la Universidad Estatal de Michigan. También trabajo actualmente para la Promesa de Lansing como defensor de los becarios, ayudando a la Promesa a tratar de averiguar lo que los estudiantes están pensando y experimentando y lo que podemos hacer para ganarnos su confianza con el fin de ayudarles realmente a encontrar el éxito.

Mi propia experiencia en el instituto fue interesante. Pensaba que iba a ir al instituto y sacar calificaciones sobresalientes. Sin embargo, no fue así. Tuve dificultades, pero no me rendí. Me gradué en el instituto después de cuatro años agotadores.

familiares hacia nuestra educación y nuestras opciones profesionales.

A principios de 2023, tuve la oportunidad de mi vida. Un hombre llamado Justin Sheehan me ofreció unas prácticas en la Promesa de Lansing.
